WORLD DYSLEXIA AWARENESS WEEK

The Dyslexia Association of Singapore held their annual World Dyslexia Awareness Week (WDAW) from 1 to 6 October 2019 to raise support for children with dyslexia, Specific Learning Differences (SpLD) and to celebrate their diverse talents. More than 10 international dyslexia organisations joined hands to raise awareness in October.

The week began with the 'Let's Embrace Dyslexia' exhibition on 1 October, supported by UOB Business Banking at the UOB Atrium, followed by the 'Clever but Cluttered' parent workshop on 2 October to improve executive function of young learners held at DAS Academy. On 3 October at the Lifelong Learning Institute, parents brought their children to a free screening for Primary 1 to 6 students. Screening allows parents to find out if their child is at-risk of dyslexia.

A "Tea with DAS Specialist Psychologists" session answered parents questions about learning differences, while medical, health and other professionals found out more about social-emotional difficulties in school-going children and SpLD comorbidities at the SpLD Seminar.

DAS organised the inaugural 'Walk for Dyslexia' on 4 October 2019, co-organised with Gardens by the Bay to raise funds for the DAS Bursary Fund to help children with dyslexia from low-income families access a range of interventional programmes and psychological assessments

WDAW 2019 culminated in the 'Score for Dyslexia' charity football match on 6 October 2019 co-organised with Sport Singapore and ActiveSG Football Academy at the Jalan Besar Stadium, a rare occasion whereby local veteran football icons will played against contending teams comprising F17 Academy Footballers and children aged seven to twelve with dyslexia. A free football clinic was conducted by coaches from the ActiveSG Football Academy before the matches.

EDUCATIONAL EXCHANGE

SINGAPORE LEARNING DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY CONFERENCE 2019

I attended the Singapore Learning Design and Technology 2019 Conference from 1 to 2 August at the Grand Copthorne Waterfront Singapore. It was a formal conference and was well attended by representatives from the National Institute of Education Singapore, various polytechnics, universities as well as experts in the field of learning design and educational technology.

Professor Emeritus Chanita Rukspollmuang, the vice president for Academic Development in Siam University did the opening of the conference as well as the first keynote, titled Design Thinking as a strategy in General Education Revision, the takeaway from her session was that tomorrow's world will not be the same as today's and therefore it is crucial that educational leaders and institutions rethink about what is offered to the students through the various programmes and initiatives. She elaborated on the new normal versus the old normal - that what used to be normal before is not the norm now and definitely, will not be the norm in the future. Hence, we are currently in the stages of getting to terms with disruptive technologies around us, in the world of disruption. The ways we learnt, the ways we did our day to day tasks and the way we lived are very different then and now.

Prof Chanita also shared on the four ways disruptive technologies affect us, using the abbreviation VUCA:

- a) V volatility, which is the rate of change
- **b)** U uncertainty, which is about being unclear about the present and the future
- c) C complexity, which is to have to deal with multiple decision factors; and lastly
- d) A ambiguity, which refers to the lack of clarity about meaning of an event.

She then proposed another VUCA to counter the earlier:

- a) V vision
- b) U understanding
- c) C clarity, and lastly
- d) A- agility. In order to equip our students with the solution-based VUCA, the focus has to be on new knowledge, skills needed for the future, with right attitudes and values in place and educational systems that guide and shape effective perfor mance from the graduates.

It was nice to hear good words of encouragement from people in the industry, and to also see and learn on what they had done and implemented. PHONOLOGICAL AWARENESS ACTIVITIES



WORD AWARENESS

Count the number of words in a sentence using counters





RHYME AWARENESS

Match a word that rhymes with colours. (eg. shoe/blue)



SYLLABLE AWARENESS

Count the number of syllables in a word by clapping or tapping drums.



ALLITERATION AWARENESS

Identify beginning sounds of a picture in a hidden egg.



PHONEMIC AWARENESS

Isolation - Give a thumbs-up signal if the word contains the sound at the target placement. Eg: "The sound is /b/ and it can be found at the beginning of the word."



Blending - Joining sounds to make a word using the blending mat.

Phonological acitivites tune children's sensitivity to speech sounds.



Close your eyes and listen to your surroundings. What sound can you spot with your ears?

WHAT ARE THE FIVE PHONOLOGICAL AWARENESS SKILLS?



WORD AWARENESS

Separate a sentence into words.



RHYME AWARENESS

Words with the same vowel and ending sound.



SYLLABLE AWARENESS

Separate words into smaller parts.



ALLITERATION AWARENESS

Words with the same beginning sound.



PHONEMIC AWARENESS

Paying with sounds through segmenting, blending, isolating manipulating phonemes
